Unit Focus

In this unit, students will analyze the effect of immigration and industrialization on the development of early American cities. The students will examine the factors that motivated people to emigrate, the lack of planning in the development of American cities, and how political machines both helped and exploited the urban poor. In addition to a unit test, students will investigate the extent to which the American Dream was or is attainable. Primary instructional materials for this unit will include primary and secondary sources as well as a U.S. History textbook *The American Pageant or The Americans, m*aps and artifacts.
